

My time at UVA has been filled with new experiences, disappointments, struggles, blessings and breakthroughs. It has certainly brought me closer to God and helped me understand His purpose for me. The friendships, life lessons and passions I have pursued at and beyond the University have made the experience one with few regrets. From competing in basketball tournaments, helping coach the women's basketball team and playing with them as a student practice player at JPJ Arena, to hearing Michelle Alexander, Jesse Jackson and Spike Lee speak, pursuing God with Black students, and earning a belt in karate, I have had so many opportunities to learn and grow at UVA. I will carry the lessons into my next opportunity as a software engineer at CoStar Realty Group.

My first day at UVA, I doubted my belonging. I met countless girls with blond hair and pearl earrings, but only 7 out of 87 classmates looked like me. I questioned how I would "find myself" in a place where I didn't even see myself. Thankfully, I found my voice, passion, and security in my Blackness. I found my voice through Ridley, which allowed me to become a leader through mentorship, cultural events, participation in NOLS (National Outdoor Leadership School) and studying abroad in Honduras. I found my passion through nursing, learning technical skills from my professors, and compassion and empathy from my patients. Lastly, I found my Blackness through my involvement in CRAVE and Diversity in Nursing for a Better Community, where I met lifelong friends and discovered the importance of cultural preservation. Although my fourth year came to an abrupt end, I am so grateful for the experiences that helped to shape me.





I am so grateful that Ridley took a chance on me, allowing me the economic freedom to explore my interests while I narrowed my career focus, served the UVA and Charlottesville community, grew into myself as a leader and found my passions. Ridley afforded me opportunities to study abroad in both St. Kitts-Nevis and Guatemala, where I learned more about how access to and quality of medical care are intimately related to socioeconomic status. This motivated me to focus my research and career on public health and medicine. Through my work as a medical scribe, I learned aspects of medical decision making and patient care. I designed my pre-medical academic path not just by studying the intersections of biology, chemistry and physics, but also by studying the underpinnings of patient care which concern equality, equity and ethics. I am so excited to continue on my journey to medicine, and I am thankful for the knowledge, friendships and memories I gained from my time at UVA.



Letter from the **Treasurer**

Total commitments of \$1,328,835 during 2020 was a significant step up from the prior year, and put the Ridley Scholarship Program on the path to achieving its campaign objectives. Total scholarship and grants disbursed was a record amount of \$362,000, benefitting 18 Scholars. We have also received generous donations to provide endowment funding for the Ridley Scholar Experience (RSX), which provides the necessary stability toward long term programmatic support. On the investment management results, over 92% of Ridley's total assets are invested in long term pools at UVIMCO. The UVIMCO Long Term Pool posted a 5.3% return, which exceeded their policy portfolio return of 3.3%. As we look ahead to the new fiscal year, we are encouraged and ask for your continued support as we remain on pace to achieve our Program goals, which will continue to increase support for the best and brightest Black Scholars.


